# IF IT'S TUESDAY, THIS MUST BE QUAHA JULY 12, 1974

The Royal Cavaliers Youth Band leaves Los Angeles and heads toward Cerritos, to do a half time show for the Cerritos 605 All-Star football game. Curing the trooping of the stands, after we performed our show, sombebody from the stands threw a cherry bomb at the band and bruised Mancy Harms, one of our ricolo players. After the show the band was treated to McDonalds Big Macs, french fries and a coke. After our 11:00 P.M. dinner, band members went to brush their teeth at the stadium washroom as we premared to board the buses and head toward Las Vegas, Nevada, We slent on the bus that night.

## July 13, 1974

At approximately 3:30 A.H., we crossed the state line that divides California from Nevada. It would be the last time we would see the Golden State for over three weeks. We got to Tas Vegas about 4:00, and we stayed until about 5:15, a little more than an hour. We then proceeded on to Cedar City, Utah. At Cedar City, where, incidentally, on Friday nights, the whole town comes out to watch the Sears truck unload, we were greeted by some of the faculty of the Southern Utah State College. We then proceeded to

reheurse most of the day, stop ing only for lunch and "A" water break. We than enjoyed a fine gournet dinner of howdogs and beens. Then we went for a eveing rade of about 200 miles to Salt Lake City, (The hot spot of the Weller U.S.,) where we stayed in the doms at Wentminster College. We had been on tour now for 24 hours. having traveled 800 miles, rehearsing. close to 6 hours and we all smelled like, woll, like when Buddy Roule just stops out of the shower (Sorry, Bud, but I had to throw that one in) Anyways we jummed into the shower and then into bed (supposedly!).

# July 14, 1974

We woke up and headed toward Cheyenne, Wyoning. On the wer we stopped for lunch at Little America (and payed bly wrices). We stayed at a high school and in the evening we had a light maic rehearsal outside the gymasium and we didn't get to eat dinner until 11:00 . M. that night, when John and several chaparones came back with the camper packed full of McDonald's homburgers. Lucky they came back then, it is just starting to rain.

# Menday July 15,

We left Cheyenne to go to Sioux Cit., Iowa. On the way we went through Nebraka, where we stopped at a small town for ice cream. The lady serving us left pointing outside to the two-lane road and saying "Feast your eyes on or new super-highway!" Wi all looked at her like we were soing to croak. but

I had a short parade in the afternoon (where it drizzled) and then we gut on our first field show on tour. we scored and dr out of 105 oins and won the show, with chowering after the show, a member of our band secidentally walked into the wrong locker room. where the opposite sor was showering, This little wishe didn't go unrotined though, because within exactly 3 seconds forty girls started ser sming and didn't stop until we got to Elongfield Hills, Lichigan !!

Jednesdey July 17

After staying overnight at the hoccori high school gys we were invited to go to a nearby lake for the day.

## Sharaday July 19

We left Linnesota and went to Carmentersville, Illinois, to face Dunder in our first meting ever. When we first arrived at out destination we had a slightly exhausting marching rehearsal. Not only was the humidity above ninety, but so was the temperature! In fact it was so humid that hike Aposta's clean and sparkling savachone was starting to gurgle. After the rehearsal, we went into our respective lysus, and peeled off our practice clothes and ut on our uniforms, se Then boarded the buses for the short icly over to the high school, You know, it's a funny thing but on the drive over to the stadium, it was just our luck that we passed a gigantic cemetary. In a ite of this we get there and had a short mulic rehearsal and varm-up, We marched out tos the field Just in tome to see Dundee perform "Amezing Grace." We took our comition on the line and Greg gave a big "Eas 'en up!!!" whereu-on the bond responded "RAH!!!" Then we went out and performed our best show yet, but the jusging was a fuke and they gave Dundee the victory 8% to our 8%. In fact the judging was so but that the jedges were long gone before the scores yere even announced to the sudience, inyways, this was the first field show our band had ever lost to anybody is two years of competition, we took the loss ind of bard, but "That's the breaks."

## Friday July 19

We left for Cheasening, idehigan. We ate lunch at Battle Creek, idehigos at our favorite place: Mark.... Cherantia, as some members remembered from last year, was the place with the lorsy water. He marched the chow agricult Rock Falls, Dridge ort, Crown and Dakote High Schools, beating them all wit our score of 80. The Band then wilked inde and antly over to the ASW Root Reer Stand, where in all my life I bave never seen anyone drink as much an Greg "Mick MCVicker". He must "we downed 21 quarts of most beer as a single eitting that's about 75-80 number of Liquid!")

#### Seturday July 20

We errived at Exidgement, Michiga, where we had a short but all important parade. We then checked into a school where all the other band. \*\*re also staying. We were assigned two classrooms for our boys, and two for our girls.

We then went to the practice field for a one hour rehearsal, had dinner, and then went to march the show. We scored a 78, and the Bridge ort, who was not in com etetibation, scored an 82. They claimed they beat us, but that's "HOGWASH" because they weren't even in competition.

Sunday July 21

An orticle appeared int the Bridge ort Times Newspaper: "Bridge port Band outscores Van Nuys (1 " ..... .. HOGWASH!!!! We left Bridge ort and arrived in beautiful Bloomfield Hills. where we ate lunch in the cafetoria, at West-Bloomfield High school, At was at this meal that the majority of the male band members went back for seconds, but didn't get, or for that matter, actually didn't want any more food, In Fast, when one of the local school girls, who was serving food, dropped a tray, about fifty flyn immediately reacted to the trajedy and all ran over offering their as istance, We then marched a very shirt parade of distance about two miles long. The papade was also very hilly, and very hot. In all of the 2-22 miles se marched we see maybe balf a dozen people watching, in the field show competition we see ad 94.9 out of 105 and on the show.

## Monday July 22

We left Nichigan and the United States and crossed the border into Canada. We had lunch in the town of London and roceeded to Bur ington, about 60 gils south of Toronto. We competed in, and won, the Kinsmen show, with a plore of 90.8 This is one of the righer shows on tour, one that carries a lightfroant title. After the show, whe bands were allowed to go swimming in an indoor Olumpic sized book. The pool had just been opened that week, and the high school its lf was firl in walso.

## Tuesday July 23

We were supposed to go to Mredonia, New York, but that show wan cancelled bacause of a lack of a place for the bands to stay overnight. So we went through Niagara Falls audby-assed fredonia and went on to Canton Ohio. We had lump

in Erie, Fensylvania at a New Place,
"The Red Barn." When we arrived at
Malone College, in Canton, we were
given a free eveing to do as we leased.
Some went to a movie, and some stayed at
the dorm.

#### Wednesday July 24

We went to logalore Ohio for a show that was in a big red brick stadium, we scored a 92.8 and Rock Falls scored a 92.6, so we just barely beat them that night. We drove back to Canton for the night.

#### Thursday July 25

In the morning those who wanted to go to the Professional Football
Hall of Fame, went from about 9:00 to about 11:00. We had a show in the evening at Dover, Chio. We scored 95.4, and Rock Falls scored a 94.8 After the show, we drove back to Canton and had lose Cream and Baskin Robbins 17 Flavors (in the Midwest Baskin-Robbins has only come // with 17 flavors). We then drove back to Malone College for the night.

## Priday July 26

We went to Akron for a show at the University of Akron Stadium which is right next to the Soap Box Derty grandstands, where they hold the amusal Soan Box Dorby, Well the Akron Stadium had astro-turf, and our band, having never march d on Astro turf, found it rather strange because everytime you would take a ster the turf beneath you would orunch, the Stadium meated about 25,00 people and was built in 1940. Unfortunat ly the stadium was not sold out but we came clase to it as 500 people pushed and shoved to getin and get good sests. e won with a 91.0 and Rock Falls scored and 87.4.

#### Saturday July 27

The band went to march the Cauton, Ohio, Hall of Fame Farade at which then-Vice Fresident Ford was attending. The parade was approximately 32 to 4 miles long and about a mile walk to the buses afterward: We marched the entire distance, including to the buses,

for about a five mile march. Last year when the band marched this parade many members complained that it was too long. But this year several others felt that it was a fun arade to march, even though it was extremely long. There were about a quarter of a million people that lined the streets. They stacked 5 or 6 recole back at the thinnest portions of the parade. It sure was an experience having 250,000 people not to mention national T.V. watching us perform.

After the parede we racked up and left Canton to got to Lexington, Chio, where we rut on a field show at the local high school. This school was in a town that was so run down the football field didn't even hade lights. Even Rock Falls has lights. It was so ridiculous, it was like Samson without hair, Lucille Ball without Desi Arna, Bud Boule without Sheri Davis, or Richard Nixon without his Sony (Tave Recorder). We we performed the show in the early evening before it got dark. W. then lost the show to Rock Falls who scored a 92. We scored a 91. One more note, the grass on the field hadn't been cut all summer so it was rather hard marching by all the osctus needles. After the show we went to bed down and the local Requet Club, That's right, we accually slept right on the tennis courts,

Sunday July 28

With one week left on tour we left Lexington and travelled to Kokomo, Indiana. We stayed at a junior high school about two miles from the High school and stedium. This was where we marched our best show on tour because we were out for revenger, were there to kill, It was the first and only time on tour that we really wanted to beat another band. Sure we were fired un against Dundee, but not as much as Rock Falls on that night at Kokomo, We marched a 96.05 mimus 3/10 of a oint for overtime for a med score or 95.75, Rock Falls scored a 92. It was the let time we won all three categories. After the show the Kokomo band held a little party in their cafeteria and the Chambaign High School Jaizy Band, who had ben traveling the entire tour with us, layed some songs. #### Hinday July 29

We left for Champa gn, Illinois and when we got there they had a sack lunch waiting for us. You heard me, a suck lunch, the kind they give out on welfare. Well these were the leftovers. We drove over to Rock Falls's
Stadium where they served us slop y
Joe sandwiches for dinner. On the way
over there we saw a house with a
little sign on their grass that said:
"Lawn of the Month". We marched an
84. Rock Falls who was just in wahibition supposedly marched and 85.
But we all know that their 86 doesn't
beat our 84. This isn't going to be
another Bridgeport.

## Wednesday July 31

We left Rock Falls and headed toward Omaha, Nebraska. On this day we crossed the Mississippi River again. When we got to Omaha we checked into Boys Town and stayed blame, we went out to dinner at a very nice cafeteria right next to a shopping center,

## Thursday August 1

We left Omaha to go to Cheyenne, Wyoming, We stayed at the same high school that we stayed at on the beginning of tours After a dinner of hot dogs and beans, the band was free to go offen their own and most people walked down to the K-Mart.

## Friday August 2

We left Cheyenne and arrived at Salt Lake City, Utah, We checked into the a me dommatories at Westminster College that we had stayed at three weeks earlier. We went out to dinner and had a choice of two places. Fizza Hut and Kentucky Fried Chicken. After dinner we walked back to the college and had an evening free.

#### Saturday August 3

We left Salt Lake City, Utah, and arrived t Cedar City where we stayed at the Southern Utah State College, We had a rehearsal in the afternoon, preparing for the above we never did when we got back to L.A. Afterwards we took showers in that Dumpy old room, and later gym, where we found dead and alive rats!

## Sunday August 4

Last Day of Tour: We left Cedar City to go home and stouped in La Vegas where some reonle went out to breakfast and all the charerones went on a gambling s ree. We left Vegas and the drave straight to Barstow where we had our last mal: Lunch at McDonald's of Course! When we arrived back in Van Nuys, at was approximately 4:30 Fall. And the Royals Junior Band was claying for us, Everybody made farewells, said goodbyes to thebus drivers, and mave their thanks to the chaperones; and that, was tour 1974.

Six main to ics were discussed and most of them concerned this year's tour.

Many cools felt they weren't allowed enough food. But the real cost of tour was \$280,00, instead of the \$250.00 the arents approved. The chaperones got the best food they could with the amount of money available. At one point, it was some members were will ng to pay the extra \$50.00 but many families can't afford the extra smount when more than one child is in the band.

Some of the judg a had no more experience than a lot of our own members. Many of the hosting bands were unable to properly amongor a show. The lodging wasn't set up in advance and they didn't follow through the guide lines that were set up concerning food or tour.

1) Get one instructor to teach marching instead of having 2 or 3 instructors each teaching a different style.

3) Have the drill written to include all units, music and drill in the beginning instead of at the lost winter

  John cointed out that a crill can't be written intil we know how many people we are going to have. We is thinking of making some type of a contract binding members from a certain date to make all rehearmals.
- 4) Have enough instructors so people are aware of their istakes.
- 5) Shorten the show 30 seconds because we're always told to rush to evoid overtime peralties,
- 6) Make sure everyone can execute his or her part of the wrill.

Recruiting has been and still is a big robles for Cavaliers. Try to build up the band at school but don't put down your school band at the same time. Be proud to be in Cavaliers. Let prospective members sit in on reheursals and attend performances. Go on a big tour every two years so money won't be a problem for members.

One of the main problems this year was the conduct and attitude of some of the people on tour.

A) Nembers should respect other who want to sleep or be left alone.

B) Give 100% at reheursals and shows. Show everyone the "Cavalier tride."

C) Have more than one instructor so they can live up to their responsibilities without becomeing irritated and upset.

D)Some members feel the erones should go along with band rules, for ext smoking. The point was brought up that, they aren't members of the band and certain rules don't ap ly.

E) Members don't get along with each other. There were constant fights and bitching among our own members and those of other bands. Sow many members (good members) are threatening to quit because of what happened. That good will having do when the band described on people like that for survival.

Certain rules of the band aren't being enforced. Because of this the rules should be inforced, reworded, or taken out. Some cople thought that rules #'s 2 and 13 should be enforced. Revised rule #6 should be taken out and revised rule #8 should be inforced along with bus rule #3.

The rules John feels should be taken seriously are:

Revised rules #'s 1,3,7,8,9, 10,11,13,14.

Ravised rehearsal rules 1 and 8 Bus rules nos. 6, and 7 All attendance rules.
